The Short Cinema is 10!

We're allowing ourselves that one exclamation mark, because it really has been a pleasure to share so many great films with you for the past decade - and this year is no different.

It's bigger, yes, but that's only because, out there, film-makers in the Midlands and beyond have continued to make our decisions on what to screen even harder. And so we have, happily, continued to expand our programme to allow us to show as many of these deserving works as we can.

For those of you joining us for the first time, The Short Cinema is an annual short film festival, with a focus on providing film-makers with an international, cinematic exhibition platform. Started in 2006, by our founding patrons Karen Foster and Stephen Naish, it began life as a pop-up festival, taking place at the Criterion Pub - before eventually moving to its new home at Phoenix Cinema & Art Centre



This move, over the last few years, has given The Short Cinema the opportunity to present the work of up-and-coming and established film-makers alike - on the big screen, where it belongs.

Over the last few years, the festival itself has expanded to include our International Departures, featuring some of the best short films from around the world and, following its launch last year, The Shortish Cinema - which accommodates those films that need just that little extra time to tell their stories.

We're also proud to be partnering with the ICA to present Outside - a curated programme of artist films that explore frontiers beyond the cinema space, and with Move It Animation on Colour Box, a collection of animated treats for families.

Though the festival has grown exponentially in size, it retains its grass roots approach and its core values: to celebrate short film - in all its forms - and to foster a creative environment in which film-making in the Midlands - and beyond - can thrive.

The Short Cinema may be 10, but in a lot of ways - thanks to our film-makers and our audiences - we are only just beginning. The festival is proud, this year, to be supported by Phoenix and Everards Brewery.

The Short Cinema - now in its tenth year - has always sought to present the very best of short film from around the Midlands. For the third year, too, The Short Cinema's Best in Festival award, will celebrate the film our judges have, in another near-impossible decision, deemed to be the best of the best. This year's trophy has been created for the festival by Leicester artist Charlie Dukes

Alongside the main programme of the night, our International Departures Lounge will also be showing a curated selection of the best International films submitted for this year's festival.

The night itself will be MC'd by local actor and director Edward Spence, fresh from numerous triumphs on-stage and behind-the-scenes and the night will close in fine style with an after-party DJ set from Social Cinema Creative Director, Alan Morton

This year we are delighted to welcome belly dance artist, hula hoop performer and burlesque sweetheart Doe Demure to the stage for our interval entertainment. Doe is based in Leicester city centre at her Skytribe Dance Studio, and has recently appeared as the opening act for the rock band Eels.

In 2010, in a further effort to support independent films, Mark established Ballpark Film Distributors and has so far released over 20 films.
